On a recent trip to Speyside, I fell in love with the gorgeous scenery as I drove through Cairngorms National Park; the drive was made even more beautiful by the autumn colours. I couldn't keep the smile off my face as my Benimar Tessoro ate up mile upon glorious mile of the A9. I now can't wait to explore Royal Deeside and the coast. Perhaps the new route will relieve some of the pressure on the Western Isles (see Travel News, January 2018), while enhancing the economy of another part of Scotland.





Scotland launches new driving route

Following the success of the North Coast 500 tourist route (see our Grand Tour in the November 2017 issue), a new Scottish driving route has just been launched.

The North East 250 covers some of the country's finest landscapes, in the Highlands and on the coast.

The 250-mile circular route encompasses the Cairngorms National Park, Speyside, the Moray coast, the east coast, Aberdeen and Royal Deeside.

Along the way, you can stop off to visit castles, explore mountains, beaches, forests and villages, and follow the Malt Whisky Trail.

The route, developed by Speyside businessman Guy Macpherson-Grant, also has support from VisitScotland. Regional director Jo Robinson said: "This area has arguably the best scenery, landscapes and views in Scotland, and we anticipate the introduction of such a route will bring economic benefit to the area and its tourism businesses."

When we checked the website (www.northeast250. com) for scheme partners, we found just one campsite, Speyside Gardens (www. speysidegardens.com), one motorhome dealership, Dyce Caravans (www.dyce caravans.co.uk), and one hire firm, Go North Campers (www.gonorthcampers.com);

but it's early days yet, and partnerships will be added.

If you're planning a tour of the route and become a member (for £25 a year), you can download an itinerary, a printed route map (an interactive map is available at www.northeast250.com/ interactive-map) and a North East 250 Passport, which can be stamped along the way.

Part of its 'A history of England in 100 Places' campaign, the top 10 "demonstrates that England has a long tradition of finding creative solutions to problems of worldwide significance", said Historic England chief executive Duncan Wilson. "It's vital we remember these places and events as an inspiration to continuing our tradition of experimenting, inventing and creating.

Broaden horizons with your phone

You are getting tired and that hill in front of you is looming large, but might there be a tearoom or a pub beyond it?

You can now find out by using the OS Maps app, with augmented reality. Just pan round the landscape with your phone or tablet and the app will be able to identify and label features.

If you have data connection, tap the label to see a page of useful information, such as walks and places to stay.

Ordnance Survey recommends that you still use paper maps when out walking, but recognises that many people like to use their phone for navigation. 
A pitch on the year-round site costs £20 per night, but this reduces to £18 per night if you book more than two nights up to 23 March.
